Central Coast Water Leaders

Meet our new education & outreach manager, Emily Gottlieb! Emily leads the Central Coast Water Leaders program. Emily is an experienced educator and community science specialist, and has managed award-winning programs for the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History. Emily received a Fulbright scholarship in 2019 to conduct intertidal research in Argentina, and has a Master's in marine biodiversity and conservation from the Scripps Institution of Oceanography. "Stewardship begins when people engage deeply with their environment," Emily said. "I'm excited to connect hands-on science with actions that youth and families can take to protect their water."

Reducing Agricultural Nitrate Runoff

On September 20, Monterey Waterkeeper led a coalition of advocates and residents to urge the State Water Board to strengthen the 2021 Central Coast Agricultural Order (Ag 4.0 or Order) and reduce fertilizer nitrate pollution into our drinking water, rivers, and ocean. Many communities in the Salinas Valley suffer from nitrate contamination, which can cause serious illness or death in babies (blue baby syndrome) and various cancers in adults. Instead of strengthening Ag 4.0, the State Water Board removed the Order's limits on fertilizer pollution. The Board committed to convening an expert panel to evaluate fertilizer use data, and will give further direction to the Regional Water Boards based on the panel's recommendations. The Board also directed the Central Coast Water Board to create an alternative drinking water program for residents that rely on nitrate-contaminated water. We will participate in these next steps to ensure that the Water Boards protect the health of our families and the environment.
